In science, we started our topic all about plants and set up an investigation to learn about what plants need to grow. We also potted our own sunflowers to take home and see who could grow the tallest flower. In maths, we have started learning about fractions and how to find fractions of amounts. In English, we have been writing a discussion based on our whole school text 'The Great Paper Caper'.

This week in Year 4, the class were introduced to several new and exciting topics for the summer term. Welcome back Year 5 and what a week it's been! Year 5 have returned full of beans and eager to go in what is going to be a very busy term. In English we have been writing a newspaper article about the changes that have happened in the KS2 playground area. We interviewed Mrs Ledger to get her view, using some of what she said as a direct quote in our article. In maths we have been calculating the perimeter of shapes and working out the cost to put up fencing around a vegetable patch. Our RE learning continued this week with us looking at the life of Buddhist monks and considering whether we could become a monk.

6 INDIA

Year 6 have absolutely hit the ground running this week! In English, we have enjoyed the whole school text, The Great Paper Caper, and learning about how court rooms work. This has lead to some interesting discussions about the justice system, as well as comparing spelling and vocabulary between British and American English. Our first block of the term is computing. We are having fun creating different types of quizzes on Purple Mash. Everyone has smashed maths this week - we have covered a huge amount as we focus on applying our calculation strategies to a wide range of reasoning questions.
